In 1984, the celebrated sociologist and historian Norbert Elias convened a major conference on 'Civilisations and civilising processes' at the Centre for Interdisciplinary Research (University of Bielefeld). Participants included the most distinguished and influential scholars in historical sociology and world history. This book will make available, for the first time in one place, the papers

presented by the speakers and, even more interestingly, the transcripts of discussions at the symposium. This conference brought together eminent and internationally reputed scholars of macro-history and historical sociology such as Johann P. Arnason, Elias, Johan Goudsblom, Keith Hopkins, William H. McNeill, and Immanuel Wallerstein. This highly informative encounter between various leading scholars of humanity's global social history has never before been published, although it was completely recorded on paper and in tape recordings. Its publication in one volume should be an important event for all students of the long-term structural transformations of humanity

Call for Session Proposals (Deadline: July 30, 2021) - RC20 Regional Conference on Comparative Sociology & The 2nd RC33 Regional Conference on Social Science Methodology

(Tokyo, Japan, 12–16 September 2022 Japan Women's University)

RC20 is pleased to invite members to submit session proposals to be considered for the RC20 Regional Conference on Comparative Sociology & The 2nd RC33 Regional Conference on Social Science Methodology in Tokyo, Japan. The conference will be held on 12–16 September 2022.

Call for session proposals guidelines:

The joint conference will reflect the focus of RC20, "Comparative Sociology," and that of RC33, "Social Science Methodology." We welcome a diverse range of topics on these themes.

Sessions should be proposed, organized, and presented in English.

Session proposals should be more than 200 words.

Session proposals should be submitted through the conference site (http://mcn-www.jwu.ac.jp/~fonaka/JC.htm).

The deadline for submission of session proposals is July 30, 2021.

The timeslot of the sessions is scheduled from 15:00 to 17:00 (Central Europe Summer Time [CEST]), which corresponds to 6:00-8:00 (US Pacific Daylight Time [PDT]), 22:00-24:00 (Japan Standard Time [JST]).

No registration fee is required for this conference.

The 1st RC20 Comparative Sociology Award for Best Papers is planned.
