(Please Read Carefully)

Registration and Accomodation -

For both purposes, a single form is available. It should be returned, together with payment, to the Swedish Local arrangement Committee (SLAC). Because accomodation in Uppsala is limited, room reservations will be accepted only from those who have also registered for the World Congress. These Registration Forms are available from SLAC and from the ISA Secretariat.

(Note: The first date for registering at the lowest registration fee had been fixed by the Executive Committee as January 31, 1978. Due to a printing error, this appeared on the yellow Registration Form as 'Jan.1/78'. We did not reprint the form because that would have delayed its distribution even more. We apologize for any inconvenience this error may have caused.)

Travel Arrangements -

Everybody is responsible for making their own travel arrangements to the World Congress. Neither SLAC nor the ISA Secretariat are planning activities in this area. However, in several countries the national associations are selecting a travel agency to organize charter and/or group flights. All participants should ask their national association for the name and address of the travel agency that has been selected for this purpose.

See also the SLAC INFORMATION section below for information on those countries where this has been communicated to us.

Travel Grants -

The Executive Committee of the ISA has set up a Travel Grants Committee with two tasks. One is to solicit grants and the other is to review applications for assistance from participants in the World Congress. With the modest funds available it will not be possible to assist more than a few participants, particularly from the poorer areas of the world. Since requests for assistance can be considered only from contributors, application forms for travel assistance are available only from the organizers of sessions.

The deadline for these application forms is March 31, 1978. The Travel Grants Committee will meet at the end of April, and all applicants will be informed of its decision early in May.

Contributed Papers -

The organization of the World Congress program is very decentralized, in the sense that the session organizers are responsible for the contents of their sessions. Participation in the Plenary Sessions is by invitation only; potential contributors to all other sessions were asked to communicate directly with the session organizers of those sessions that seemed to fit their interests. Their names and addresses have been published in each Bulletin as they became available. However, since work on the program started two and a half years ago, and since all deadlines will have passed by the time you receive this Bulletin, it will be too late to add further contributions.

Only those papers will be presented during the World Congress which have been accepted by the chairperson of the session in which the participant wants to present a paper.

Copyrights -

Contributors to this program should be aware of the fact that the publication of the "Transactions of the World Congresses" has been discontinued; they have been replaced by a series of volumes entitled "Sage Studies in International Sociology". This means that not all contributions will be published by the ISA. The selection of papers and sessions to be actually published in this new series will be made by the Publications Committee in consultation with editors and the Editorial Board. Until such decisions have been made, the ISA reserves to itself the copyright on all papers contributed to the Official Program (Plenary Sessions, Working Groups and Symposia). Authors will be informed as soon as decisions on publication have been taken; in the cases of papers that are not to be included in one of the SSIS volumes, the ISA relinquishes the copyright and the author is free to make other plans for publication.

Important Deadlines -

Most of the dealines have now passed. They are indicated here only for your information.

Abstracts: Abstracting forms were distributed to all session organizers with a deadline of February 28, 1978. In order to allow for delays caused by the postal services, abstracts received by March 23, 1978 will be included in the abstracts booklet distributed with the registration materials at the Congress. All abstracts received after that date will be included in a second abstract booklet that will be published immediately after the Congress. (see also page 29)

Program Booklet: As in the past, a program booklet will be distributed to all registrants on arrival in Uppsala. The information to be included is provided by the session organizers to the ISA Secretariat. The deadlines for the receipt of this information was fixed as March 31, 1978.

Reproduction of Papers: Due to the increasing costs of providing this service, the Executive Committee had to make some hard decisions. Papers must be limited to ten (10) pages of single-spaced typing on 8 1/2" x 11" (or 21 1/2 x 28 cm). Only papers to be presented in sessions of the 'Official Program' (Plenary Sessions, Working Groups and Symposia) can be reproduced beforehand for sale at the Congress. But in order to do this, one copy of each paper must be sent to the ISA Secretariat and another copy must be sent to SLAC (IX World Congress of Sociology, c/o RESO Congress Service, S-105 24 Stockholm, Sweden) by March 31, 1978.

Papers for all other sessions (Research Committees, Ad Hoc Groups, etc.) cannot be reproduced beforehand. Authors may make their own copies and send them to SLAC, or bring them along for distribution. However, these papers can be reproduced during the Congress on demand; but only if they conform to the above specifications and deadline.

NOTE: A great many authors have ignored the above specifications and sent papers of more than ten (10) pages. In view of the costs of reproduction, it will be difficult to reproduce such texts and make them available for sale at the World Congress.

Note on the Program: Potential participants in sessions may want to have more information on the content and format of their session than is published in this Bulletin. To obtain such information, please communicate with the appropriate session organizers.

The first Registration Forms started coming in at the end of December 1977. Up to the first deadline, January 31, we had received 430 forms together with their respective bank-drafts. Swedish Local Arrangements Committee

The Publications Committee met in London, England on January 25-26, 1978. Space and hospitality was provided by Sage Publications and the Committee expressed its gratitude for these generous arrangements, to Katy and David Brooks.

"Current Sociology" -

Margaret Archer reported on "Current Sociology". Volume 25 (1977) and Volume 26 (1978) are appearing on time. The sole problem that remains is to finally eliminate the time lag between the year a volume is published and the year during which ISA members receive it. This means that during one year - either 1978 or 1979 - ISA members should receive two volumes. Due to the financial implications of such a move, it was decided to leave this decision to the New Executive Committee when it meets in Uppsala. The editor reported that she has succeeded in signing a much larger number of contracts for future numbers; thus there is every reason to believe that "Current Sociology" will continue to be published on time.

The problems still left over from the days when "Current Sociology" was published by Mouton remain unsettled and have become more complicated due to the fact that Mouton has since been sold. However, one of their people is coming to London in February * to attempt to finally sort out these problems in cooperation with Sage. Among these outstanding problems is the fact that number two (2) of volume 23 still have not been published although they have had the manuscript for over two years. It was decided that this problem be submitted to the Executive Committee in August.

(*Note: Since then, the February meeting between Mouton and Sage has taken place, and an agreement between them has been signed; it appears that all of the outstanding problems will shortly be settled.)

The budget was discussed on the basis of estimates for the year 1977 and it seems that "Current Sociology" is about to become a self-financing enterprise and may even begin to show a surplus in the future

The Publications Committee also discussed some policy issues which had first been presented by the editor in 1972 in a draft report on the content of "Current Sociology". At that time it was recommended that the trend reports should be longer and the bibliographies shorter; this has been accomplished and is making for more lively presentations. It was approved that this change remains in effect. Closer collaboration between the publication and research committees has also been implemented and is approved. An earlier suggestion that the ISA Bulletin might be incorporated with "Current Sociology" has not been implemented, and it was approved that they should remain separate publications. A more complicated matter concerned the mix between trend reports on the sociology of, and in, a country or region and trend reports on theory, methods, and different substantive areas. It was approved that the present mix be continued such that each volume contains trend reports of both kinds. The regional trend reports should not be only descriptive, but should also be interpretative. While initially such regional reports should be written by 'insiders' (of the country or region), eventually the editor may also consider reports written by 'outsiders'. The suggestion that we might add a section of commentaries and replies has both advantages (increased liveliness and continuity from issue to issue) and disadvantages (delays in publication, more editorial work, dilution of the journal's traditional format). It was suggested that it might be tried with one of the issues planned for 1980 or 1981, that it would require a sub-editor for the subject chosen, and that it should be discussed by the New Executive Committee in August. A new section for 'correspondence' was also approved and should be started now by inviting some individuals to contribute letters to a future issue.

Finally, the succession in the editorship was discussed and it was suggested that in future, editors should change in between World Congresses rather than at the time of a World Congress. This suggestion was approved and Margaret Archer agreed to serve until mid-1980. This also gives the committee more time to find a replacement.

"Sage Studies in International Sociology"

Guido Martinotti presented the report on SSIS and also agreed that he too would stay on as editor until mid-1980.

He presented a financial report from the beginning of the series and a budget for 1978. It had been expected that such a new series would take some time to become established and known. On the basis of estimates for 1977 (the financial statement will arrive later) it seemed that the series would break even and might begin to show some income in the future.

Katy Brooks from Sage reported that we have now published 12 volumes and that 3 more volumes will be ready before the World Congress because the completed manuscripts are in.

Martinotti reported on some additional proposals of which two were accepted because concrete materials had been received. The others were either turned down or tabled until the August meeting when more concrete details on these proposals might be available. There was great reluctance to accept proposals that might interfere with the publication of volumes arising out of the work of the 9th World Congress.

All of the sessions organizers have been contacted to alert them to the possibility of publishing a volume in this series. In most cases it was too early for a definitive reply because they had not yet seen the papers of their contributors. However, the editor will stay in contact with them and hopes to minimize the delay in publication after the World Congress. In addition, M. Bassand and T. Bottomore promised to have an outline for their projected volume, based on the Transactions of the past World Congresses, ready by the end of 1978.

The editor also reported that he has been attempting to streamline the work of the editorial board by having each member indicate the areas of his interest and the subject matter on which he would be ready to be consulted.

The Publications Committee adjourned with a sense that the publications of the ISA are making real progress, and with a vote of thanks to the editors and the hosts.

REPORT FROM THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

The Executive Committee, at its meeting in Warsaw, had authorized a meeting in January right after the meeting of the Publications Committee to deal primarily with matters concerning the World Congress. This meeting was to be attended by the President, the Vice-Presidents, and such other members of the Executive Committee as would be in London for the Publications Committee. No travel budget was authorized for this meeting. This meeting took place on January 27-28. A summary of the agenda items follows.

1. The report from the Publications Committee was received and approved. It was also decided that this Spring Bulletin should again contain the preliminary program for the Congress, including the latest changes and additions. The Summer Bulletin should appear in June without a further listing of the program, but containing factual materials about the ISA.

2. The official program for the World Congress was reviewed and several vacancies were filled. Some late proposals for additional sessions were also reviewed and were either approved or referred to other sessions. The publication date of the Spring Bulletin was postponed to make it possible to include a brief statement for each session on the content, to be solicited from the session organizers.

3. The Travel Grants Committee reported that so far about \$70,000 had been raised and that the Research Committee on Sociolinguistics had received a grant of \$15,000; it was also decided that the ISA will make a contribution from its general fund, the exact amount to be determined when we examine our financial position. A meeting was fixed for April 27-28 in Paris, and the committee was empowered to make final decisions on the distribution of funds at that meeting. Participation in the program is to remain the major criterion in reviewing requests for travel assistance.

4. SLAC reported on arrangements for accommodation, meals, meeting rooms, and office space. A host of details concerning the budget, the printing of the program, staffing, etc. were discussed. Book displays will be organized by 'Academia' who have offices in the Federal Republic of Germany and in the United States of America. After some discussion, the following four categories of displays were decided upon:

- a. There will be an exhibit by commercial publishers organized by 'Academia', but they will not have exclusive rights to space. Individual publishers can also arrange displays independently by dealing directly with SLAC.
- b. There will be additional exhibit space available to ISA member associations and scientific bodies.
- c. There will be a special display of ISA publications organized in conjunction with Sage Publications apart from whatever other display Sage may arrange under Category a.
- d. Any other displays can be arranged only with the permission of the ISA.

5. The Membership and Finance Committee reported that both individual and collective memberships are slowly increasing due to the recruitment campaign of the Secretariat and the wide-spread interest in the World Congress. Several applications for collective membership were approved, and several others are awaiting completion of documentation.

6. The meetings of the ISA Council in August were discussed and a draft of a memo by the President was discussed and approved. This memo will be sent to all delegates in order to have them consider some of the procedural details beforehand. One amendment to the constitution was approved for distribution. Other problems arising out of our present Statutes were tabled for future consideration; the Constitutional Committee which had been established in Warsaw for this purpose was disbanded; it had been unable to begin its work due to the heavy workload associated with the preparations for the World Congress. The membership of the ISA Council was also reviewed and a number of problematic cases were discussed; in one case, where a liaison committee could not reach agreement, the Executive Committee offered to act as arbitrators, as provided for in the Statutes.

7. Finally, the location of the Secretariat was discussed. Since the Executive Committee had previously expressed a preference for remaining in the present location, the Secretariat reported on that possibility. The present location can be retained for one year; after that the Université du Québec à Montréal moves to a new campus and the space arrangements will have to be reviewed. But there seems to be no problem about space in Montreal. As previously approved, C. Saint-Pierre will stay on for one year and K. Jonassohn will stay on for four years. A replacement for C. Saint-Pierre should be looked for in the same university in which the Secretariat finds space. The most serious problem is the government grant. The Provincial Government is reviewing its granting priorities and the decisions on the renewal of the present grant has been delayed. The situation will be reviewed again in Uppsala in the light of the latest information.

IN MEMORIAM - GEORGES FRIEDMANN

The death of Georges Friedmann on November 15, 1977 was a tragic loss for French sociology and for international sociology. Others will be able to write more fully than I can do about his work in France, but it was there that I first got to know him, in 1951/52, in his seminar (one of the most rewarding I have ever attended) on industrial sociology at the Centre d'Etudes Sociologiques, in the creation and development of which he played a major part. Later, I was closely associated with him, in various ways, through my involvement in the first English translation of one of his books, as Executive Secretary of the ISA when he became its President in 1959, and thereafter when he became a personal friend, who regularly visited our family in Vancouver and in Sussex. Georges Friedmann was a profound and creative scholar, wholeheartedly committed to the international development of sociology, and aside from his immense contribution to our Association from its earliest days he will be long remembered for the stimulus that he gave to the growth of sociology in Latin America. He was a man of wisdom and conscience, and always a good-humoured and entertaining companion. Many people were indebted to him for counsel and help and will mourn his death, and I personally shall not forget all that I learned from him, or the sheer pleasure of being in his company.

Georges Friedmann qui vient de disparaître à 75 ans a joué un rôle important dans la sociologie à la fois par son oeuvre personnelle et par la place qu'il a occupé dans de nombreuses organisations. Il fut Président de l'Association Internationale de Sociologie et fut aussi le premier président de la Faculté Latino-Américaine des Sciences Sociales. Mais s'il faut rappeler son rôle dans la vie professionnelle de la sociologie il faut surtout rappeler l'indépendance et la pénétration d'esprit de ce grand penseur. Il a réfléchi et s'est engagé sur beaucoup des problèmes les plus importants de notre temps. Attiré par le communisme il fut un des premiers à publier une analyse sérieuse et très en avance sur son temps de l'évolution de la société soviétique. Il fut surtout un des premiers à donner toute leur importance aux problèmes du travail industriel et à ceux de la culture et des communications de masse. Au cours de la dernière décennie une grande partie de sa réflexion se porta sur Israël d'une manière très originale. Ses travaux sociologiques n'avaient jamais été séparés d'une réflexion philosophique portant en particulier sur Spinoza et s'étaient de plus en plus rapprochés d'une méditation de moraliste très apparente dans son grand livre: La puissance et la sagesse. Georges Friedmann correspond parfaitement à un des grands types intellectuels qu'attirent les sciences sociales. Il ne séparait pas le goût de la connaissance et le respect de ses exigences d'une passion concrète pour la liberté qui le porta à critiquer les dogmes ou les mythologies qui empêchent de voir dans l'ordre social ce qui menace la vérité et la liberté. Il a abordé beaucoup de thèmes qui sont devenus des sujets classiques de réflexion et d'étude dans le monde sociologique et au dehors avec une avance qui témoigne de sa perspicacité et de la profondeur de sa réflexion. C'est cette ouverture d'esprit qui lui donna une si vaste audience. Très nombreux sont ceux qui ont été ses élèves ou qui ont été inspirés dans leur propre travail par ses idées.
